PRESIDENT'S REPORT

his has been a year of unprecedented focus on our world of immigrant and refugee settlement. So much so I am tempted to invoke Charles Dickens' Tale of Two Cities, "It was the best of times. It was the worst of times." Long awaited openings emerged to bring attention to the world-wide plight of refugees. After the new federal government's November announcement of the 25,000 Syrians before year end, things rapidly kicked into action and moved forward at breakneck speed. Many Canadians felt proud to be able to see ourselves as a generous and welcoming nation rather than a fearful and suspicious one. The public interest in the private sponsorship of refugees soared—many of the negative and fearful voices were sidelined. AMSSA members had to rally in order to respond to that interest—so many volunteers and donors wanting to help all across the province. Media was inordinately interested in our refugee resettlement programs and our world of immigrant settlement. Timelines were changed; contracts extended. There were cuts to some services and some services added. All in all, a quite stressful and interesting year.

AMSSA had to respond quickly to requests to convene meetings, keep its membership informed and allow them to feed into the planning for refugee arrivals. We worked with both the federal and the provincial governments both nationally and provincially. Communications were kept up to date and emerging understandings shared. AMSSA continued to collaborate with other national, regional and provincial umbrellas and represented British Columbia and our members' concerns very ably.

This is the last year of sixteen years that we will have been able to rely on Lynn Moran's capable leadership. We wish Lynn every happiness in her well-deserved retirement. And, we look forward to AMSSA's next chapter.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

became Executive Director of AMSSA in August, 2000. This is my sixteenth and final Annual Report, as I am retiring at the end of June. It has been my pleasure to build the organization's capacity and lead it into its role as a key player on the Western Region and National stages. Over my years at AMSSA, I have been privileged to work with remarkable, passionate, committed staff, board members, member agency personnel and others connected to the settlement sector. I am honoured to have shared the journey with you.

AMSSA continues to grow. We increased our technology capacity by acquiring additional equipment and training staff to improve our online services and their delivery. We have also adapted program activities funded by IRCC to better meet stakeholder needs.

Webinars on building collaboration through social media, capacity through mentorship programs, trauma informed practice, curriculum development had over 1150 connections.

Webcasts on LGBTQ newcomers, immigrant seniors, immigrant and refugee children and self-employment focused on learning needs in the sector, attracting 1500 views.

Four e-symposia reached over 1500 service providers.
Settlement Net had over 26,600 views and eight more
"Migration Matters Information Sheets" summarizing research
resources were produced. Specialized Resource Web Pages
offering online resources to frontline workers had over 1600 views.

All of these learning opportunities remain accessible through amssa.org.

The Immigrant Integration Coordinating Committee continued to provide leadership and valuable strategic programming direction. The Settlement Program Planning Committee brought together sector representatives, three levels of government, and other stakeholders to discuss policy and programming issues. The Research Advisory Committee met to develop settlement research priorities.

The BC Service Working Groups participated in an all-day virtual Learning Exchange, connecting with community stakeholders for discussions on settlement services.

A Provincial Syrian Refugee Settlement Working Group meeting allowed settlement providing organizations to share their communities' capacity to support Syrian refugees.

AMSSA transformed our popular Safe Harbour: Respect for All certification program into a sustainable, membership-based program. Eleven facilitators deliver training in communities across BC.


Cultures West Magazine editions focused on Pathways to Citizenship and Immigrant Access to the Workplace.
